Method:

Heat oven to 180°C/ 350°F /Gas 4. In large bowl, beat butter with electric mixer on high speed until creamy. Beat in sugar and vanilla. On low speed, beat in flour until blended. Divide dough in half. Between 2 sheets of waxed paper, roll 1 portion of dough to 1/4-inch thickness. Cut with 2 1/2-inch round cookie cutter. On ungreased cookie sheet, place cut outs about 2 inches apart. Repeat with second portion of dough. Bake 12 to 14 minutes or until set and just barely light golden (do not overbake). Remove from cookie sheets to cooling racks; cool completely. In medium microwavable bowl, microwave caramels and milk uncovered on High 2 minutes 30 seconds, stirring every 30 seconds, until melted and smooth. Frost each cookie with about 1 rounded teaspoon caramel mixture. In small microwavable bowl, melt chocolate and 1 tablespoon butter uncovered on High 1 minute 30 seconds, stirring every 30 seconds, until melted and smooth. Drizzle chocolate over caramel on each cookie. Sprinkle generously with salt. Let stand until set.

Courgette Bread Crown

Ingredients:

11b / 450g Grated Courgette, pinch of Salt, 1¼1b Plain Flour, 2 Sachets Easy Blend Dried Yeast, 4Tbsp / 60ml Grated Parmesan Cheese, Pinch of Ground Black Pepper, 2 Tbsp / 30ml Olive Oil, Lukewarm Water, Milk and Sesame Seeds

Method: Grated the courgettes, then spoon them into a colander, sprinkle lightly with salt. Leave them to drain for 30 minutes, and then pat dry with kitchen paper.

Mix the flour, yeast, and Parmesan cheese together and season with the black pepper. Stir in the Olive oil and courgettes, and add enough lukewarm water to make a firm dough.

Knead the dough on a lightly floured surface until smooth, then return to the mixing bowl, cover with oiled clear film and leave to rise in a warm place, until doubled in size. Meanwhile grease and line a 23cm/9in round sandwich tin. Preheat the oven to 200°C/400°F/ Gas 6.

Punch down the dough, and knead it lightly. Break into 8 balls, roll each one and then arrange then in the tin to create your crown in the tin. Brush the tops with milk and sprinkle with sesame seeds.

Allow to rise again, and then bake for 25 minutes or until golden brown. Cool slightly in tin, then turn out on to a wire rack to completely cool.

Sausage Plait

Ingredients: 7oz /225g plain flour ½ teaspoon salt8oz / 250g cold butter, cut into small cubes 150ml ice-cold water, 1 tbsp butter,1 small onion, diced, 1kg/2¼lb good sausage meat,1 free-range egg, beaten

Method: Mix the flour and salt in a large mixing bowl. Place it in the fridge for a few minutes until the flour feels cold. Starting out with cold flour makes better puff pastry. Stir the butter into the flour using the blade of a dinner knife until each piece is well coated. Add the water, then quickly use the knife to bring everything together. Using one hand, grab the pastry in the bowl and place it on the work surface. Shape it to a very flat roll only by pressing on it, and not by kneading it. Wrap in cling film and refrigerate for 15 minutes. Roll out the pastry on a lightly floured work surface in one direction to a rectangle about 1cm thick and measuring about 45x15cm. Keep the sides straight by shaping them with your hands. The top and bottom edges should be as square as possible. Fold the bottom third of the pastry up and the top third down so it makes a 15x15cm piece. If your piece is slightly larger or smaller, that is OK too, as long as the corners are neat. Rotate the pastry so that its open side is facing to the right side like a book. Use a rolling pin to press the edges together. Repeat the rolling out and folding of the pastry as described, a total of four times. There will be little specks of butter scattered all over the pastry. If at any point the pastry feels too soft or starts springing back when you roll it out, it has become too warm. In that case wrap it in cling wrap and chill for 10 minutes, then continue the rolling and folding. Wrap the pastry and chill for at least 1 hour. Preheat the oven to 200C/180C Fan/Gas 6. Roll out the pastry into a rectangle about 25cm/10in by 20cm/8in. Heat the butter in a frying pan, and add the onion, cooking until it is softened but not coloured. In a mixing bowl, combine the onion and the sausage meat well. Put the sausage mixture down the middle of the long length of the pastry. With a sharp knife, cut slits 3cm/1in apart, 1cm/½in away from the sausage mixture to the edge of the pastry, slanting away from you. Brush with beaten egg. Starting at the end nearest to you, fold the pastry alternately over each other, to give a 'plait' effect. Brush the top with beaten egg. Transfer to a baking tray and bake in the centre of the oven for 40 minutes, reducing the temperature to 150C/130C Fan/Gas 2 after 20 minutes. Serve in slices hot or cold

EXHIBITORS' RULES

- 1. No entry will be accepted without the appropriate Entrance Fee and only one entry per person per class is allowed.
- Intending exhibitors must give notice in writing on the form at the end of this schedule to the Entry Secretary by Wednesday 4th September 2019. ENTRIES ACCEPTED AFTER THIS DATE ONLY AT THE DISCRETION OF THE COMMITTEE. Please avoid this as much as possible to enable the correct staging of exhibits.
- 3. **CLASS CARDS** exhibitors should apply for cards on arrival at the Hall. These are to be placed (reversed) in front of or on the exhibits before judging. Any exhibit without a card will be considered as not for competition.
- 4. The Hall will be open from 8.15 am on the day of the Show and all exhibits must be staged and ready for the judges by 10:30am when all must retire from the Hall except the officials and nothing will be received for competition after that time. The public will be admitted from 2pm and nothing may be removed from the Hall until after the draws have been completed.
- 5. The judges will be directed to withhold or reduce the prizes where specimens may be considered as unworthy. The judges are empowered to award extra prizes subject to the approval of the committee.
- 6. All flowers, fruit and vegetable for exhibition must have been grown by the exhibitor except in Classes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 63.
- 7. Classes for floral art are as follows:

Young People :Class 63. This class must be arranged in the Hall on the morning of the Show in the presence of a steward only.

Adult Classes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6.

Notes: An "exhibit" can be with or without accessories but the accessory must not predominate. Artificial plant material may **NOT** be used. The exhibit must be within the confines of the space allocated.

- 8. For guidance to exhibitors in Class 8, Collection of Vegetables, the number of each kind, followed by the maximum points available in brackets are:
 - 5 Potatoes (20), 6 Runner Beans (18), 6 Broad beans (15), 3 Carrots (20), 3 Beetroot (15), 3 Parsnips (20)
 - 6 French Beans (15), 6 Pods of Peas (20), 3 Onions (20), 2 Cabbages (15), 3 Turnips (15), 2 Marrows (15),
 - 5 Tomatoes (18), 2 Lettuce (15), 3 Heads of Celery (20), 9 Brussels Sprouts (15), 2 Cauliflower (20), 3 Leeks (20).

Maximum size of board 61cms (2ft) x 92cms (3ft).

- 9. For guidance to exhibitors in Class 10, Collection of Salad Vegetables, the number of each kind shall be:
 - 4 Tomatoes 1 Cucumber 2 Lettuce 2 Sweet Peppers 5 Spring Onions 2 Beetroot 1 Celery

Maximum space allotted 61cms (2ft) x 92cms (3ft).

- 10. Definition of a **BOWL**. A vessel that is wider than it is tall but not exceeding 26cms (10") width.
- 11. Definition of a **VASE**. A vessel that is taller than it is wide.
- 12 No wild plant material to be used from the National Park.

EXHIBITORS' RULES (continued)

Dr A J Danby Memorial Trophy

This trophy is donated by the Society in memory of the late Dr Danby and will be awarded on a three yearly cycle to the exhibitor gaining the highest number of points in Classes 11 to 29. The winners of the trophy in 2017 and 2018 will not be eligible to receive the trophy in 2019.

The committee reserve the right to visit by commission, before or after the Show, the gardens from which the plants, flowers, fruit or vegetables have been entered for competition. This does NOT apply to Classes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 63.

Most careful arrangements will be made for the protection of all exhibits but the committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage they may sustain on their way to, from or during the Show.

The decision of the judges is final and any protest must be made <u>IN WRITING</u> and handed to the Hon Secretary before 3.30 pm on the day of the Show. Any enquiries concerning the prizes allocated can be made to the Hon Secretary.

Any person not adhering to the above rules will be disqualified.
