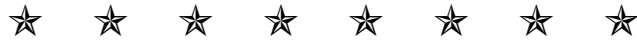

Children Recipe

Angel Whispers Vanilla Cup Cakes

3oz/85g butter or margarine

4oz/100g caster sugar

1oz/30g cornflour

2 eggs separated

Half a teaspoon vanilla essence

Preheat your oven to 375f/190c/ gas mark 5

Firstly separate the egg yolks from the whites, whisk the whites with a clean dry whisk until they peak as if you were making a meringue. Next cream butter or margarine with the sugar and vanilla essence until mixture is soft and white.

Now use a sieve to blend the flour and cornflour nicely into a separate bowl then fold this into your butter and sugar mixture

Lastly gently fold in the whisked egg white Use two spoons to fill some cake cases lifting the mixture out in first spoon and using the second to push the mixture into the case (usually makes about ten cakes). Place in the centre of the oven for 15 to 20mins

Suggestion - Used coloured cake cases and toppings of their own choice to complement the cases would introduce a design challenge

Old English Cider Cake

8oz/225g plain flour
One and a half teaspoons of grated nutmeg
Quarter teaspoon of cinnamon
One teaspoon of baking powder
Pinch of salt
4oz/100g butter or margarine
4oz /100g caster sugar
2eggs
4fl oz /125ml dry still Cider

Method: Line and slightly grease a shallow 8" /20cm square cake tin. Set oven to 350f / 180 c /gas mark 4
Sift the flour into a bowl with the spices, baking powder and salt. Cream the butter or margarine with the sugar until light and fluffy, then beat in the eggs. Beat half the flour mixture into the creamed mixture beat in half the Cider. Repeat using the remaining flour and Cider
Spoon the mixture into the prepared tin and bake for 50-55 minutes until the cake is cooked through and firm to the touch. Cool on a wire rack.

Cheese Sable's

6oz /170g plain flour
Pinch of cayenne pepper, salt and black pepper
4oz/100g butter
3oz/85g grated hard cheese
1egg yolk
Tablespoon cold water

Method: Sift the flour into a bowl and add cayenne pepper salt and black pepper . Add the butter in pieces and rub in with your fingertips. Lightly mix together the egg yolk and water then add it to the flour mixture. Bring it together into a rough dough with a fork, turn onto a floured board and work it just long enough to remove any cracks in the dough. Shape into a long roll approximately 1inch /25mm diameter, wrap in cling film and chill in the fridge until firm. Heat the oven to 375f/190c /gas mark 5
Grease three baking sheets (makes 36 biscuits)
With a sharp knife slice through the dough making rounds about half an inch thick place 12 rounds on each sheet
Lightly beat the egg white to make a wash, brush each round and sprinkle **your choice of three different toppings**. Place in the preheated oven and bake until golden brown usually 10-12 minutes. Allow to cool for 1minute before transferring to a wire rack to continue cooling.

Lemon Shortbread

200g Plain Flour
50g Cornflour
175g Butter
75g Caster Sugar
Zest of one lemon

Grease & line a 7" (18cm) tin.

In a large bowl cream the butter & sugar together until light & fluffy, add the lemon zest and then add the mixed flour & cornflour until it all starts to combine. Knead with your hands and press into the lined tin.

Chill for about an hour.

When ready bake at 140° for about 30mins until firm but do not overcook and brown.

Cool on a wire rack. When cold cut into eight pieces.

EXHIBITORS' RULES

1. Only one entry per person per class is allowed. There will be no entry fee for this year.
2. Intending exhibitors must give notice in writing on the form at the end of this schedule to the Entry Secretary by Wednesday 2nd September 2020. **ENTRIES ACCEPTED AFTER THIS DATE CANNOT BE ACCEPTED.**
3. **CLASS CARDS** - exhibitors should apply for cards on arrival at the Hall. These are to be placed (reversed) in front of or on the exhibits before judging. Any exhibit without a card will be considered as not for competition.
4. The Committee will accept entries at tables outside the Hall between 4 and 6pm on Friday 4th for non-perishable exhibits and between 8.30am and 10 am on Saturday 5th September for perishable exhibits. Only Committee Members and Judges are allowed into the Hall until it opens to the public at 2.00pm
5. The judges will be directed to withhold or reduce the prizes where specimens may be considered as unworthy. The judges are empowered to award extra prizes subject to the approval of the committee.
6. All flowers, fruit and vegetable for exhibition must have been grown by the exhibitor except in Classes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 63.
7. Classes for floral art are as follows:

Adult Classes 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6.

Notes: An "exhibit" can be with or without accessories but the accessory must not predominate. Artificial plant material may **NOT** be used. The exhibit must be within the confines of the space allocated.
8. For guidance to exhibitors in Class 8, Collection of Vegetables, the number of each kind, followed by the maximum points available in brackets are:

5 Potatoes (20), 6 Runner Beans (18), 6 Broad beans (15), 3 Carrots (20), 3 Beetroot (15), 3 Parsnips (20)
6 French Beans (15), 6 Pods of Peas (20), 3 Onions (20), 2 Cabbages (15), 3 Turnips (15), 2 Marrows (15),
5 Tomatoes (18), 2 Lettuce (15), 3 Heads of Celery (20), 9 Brussels Sprouts (15), 2 Cauliflower (20), 3 Leeks (20).

Maximum size of board 61cms (2ft) x 92cms (3ft).
9. For guidance to exhibitors in Class 10, Collection of Salad Vegetables, the number of each kind shall be:

4 Tomatoes 1 Cucumber 2 Lettuce 2 Sweet Peppers 5 Spring Onions 2 Beetroot 1 Celery **Maximum space allotted 61cms (2ft) x 92cms (3ft).**
10. Definition of a **BOWL**. A vessel that is wider than it is tall but not exceeding 26cms (10") width.
11. Definition of a **VASE**. A vessel that is taller than it is wide.
12. 1 x Photograph to be emailed to Hon Secretary. The committee will print and display photograph for judging.
- 12 **No wild plant material to be used from the National Park .**

Most careful arrangements will be made for the protection of all exhibits but the committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage they may sustain on their way to, from or during the Show.

The decision of the judges is final and any protest must be made **IN WRITING** and handed to the Hon Secretary before 3.30 pm on the day of the Show. Any enquiries concerning the prizes allocated can be made to the Hon Secretary.

Any person not adhering to the above rules will be disqualified.
